Keep Your Personal Information Safe in 2023

From the Ramsey County Sheriff's Office Block Captain News:

Scammers and hackers are always looking for new ways to <u>steal your personal information online</u>. Make your Resolution List complete by adding "update my security software" and "<u>protect my personal information</u>" to the mix. Here are some steps you can take to help protect yourself and your information:

- Keep your security software, internet browser, and operating system up to date. Updating your software regularly helps make sure you have critical patches and protections against security threats.
- Create and use strong passwords. Making a password longer 12 characters or more is one of the easiest ways to increase its strength. Consider using a passphrase of random words so that your password is more memorable but avoid using common words or phrases. Check out this password checklist, and don't use the same password for different accounts.
- Use multi-factor authentication. Some accounts offer extra security by requiring two or more credentials to log in. You may have to give both a password and a passcode you get from an authentication app to log into your account. Multi-factor authentication makes it harder for scammers to log in to your accounts even if they manage to steal your username and password.
- Back up your data to protect it. Keep an extra copy of all your files with a secure cloud storage service or save your files to an external storage device. That way, if something happens say a virus, your device crashes, or you're hacked you still have your files.
- **Protect your home network**. Your devices, accounts, and whole network are only as secure as your router since it's the connecting point between your devices and the internet. Check out how to <u>make</u> your router more secure.

Also, remember to report fraud, scams, or bad business practices to the FTC at ReportFraud.ftc.gov.

When kids are off of school, it's natural for them to want to be outside, and water and ice tends to be a natural draw. Please remind children of these dangers and to keep off the North Oaks Lakes. Many of the lakes, including but not limited to Charley Lake, Pleasant Lake, and Lake Gilfillan, have running water/aeration that makes ice thickness very unpredictable.

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources reminds everyone that lakes and ponds throughout the state have started to freeze – and where ice hasn't completely formed, the water is dangerously cold. It's up to everyone to choose to stay safe around the water or ice. Where there is ice, its thickness this time of year is highly variable and subject to the whims of Mother Nature. And where ice hasn't formed – or where it freezes at night and opens during the day – the water temperature is so low that an unexpected fall in can be deadly. Many of us will be gathering with family and friends during the holidays. With many respiratory diseases spreading right now, including flu, RSV, and COVID-19, it is important to take steps to help everyone celebrate safer!

Highlights from the City Council Meeting on Thursday, January 12th

- City Council met in closed session prior to the regular City Council meeting to discuss pending litigation. No action was taken.
- Council approved polling places for the 2023 School Board Election. The polling place for the August 8th Primary will be at the North Oaks Council Chambers – 100 Village Center Drive, Suite 150. The polling place for the November General Election will be the North Oaks Golf Club – 54 East Oaks Road.
- Council approved a resolution in support of the Ramsey County Interstate 35E/County Road J
 Corridors of Commerce Grant application. This is a project that will improve interstate access,
 bicycle and pedestrian mobility and overall congestion and safety for transportation users while
 also creating new economic development opportunities for the immediate project area.
- Deputy Matt Lassegard gave a report to Council on calls for service in the City over the past five
 years. There were 1,574 calls for service in 2022, with the top reasons being medical assists,
 traffic stops and alarms sounding. Deputy Lassegard encouraged residents to continue to call for
 service if they see issues or unusual activity in the neighborhood. He recommended larger "No
 Trespassing" signs at the Hwy 96 entrance and Wildflower entrance.
- Council approved an ordinance amending City Code Chapter 110 Tobacco regulations. This amendment brings the ordinance up to date with state regulations.
- Council approved an ordinance adopting the 2023 Fee Schedule for the City. The fee schedule will be available on the City website HERE:
- Council approved the appointment of new Planning Commission Members: David Cremons, Stig Hauge and Grover Sayer, as well as the appointment of Dave Cremons as the new Planning Commission Chair. Council also made appointments for the Mayor and Council members setting 2023 Appointments/City Responsibilities.
- Council approved Mayor Wolter and Administrator Kress to negotiate with the law firm Levander, Gillen & Miller to appoint Bridget Nason as the City Attorney.
- Council is planning a strategy session for January 28th to work on setting their goals and strategy for the year. Councilor Shah encouraged residents to reach out to her with any thoughts or suggestions for the direction they would like Council to take.
- Councilor Shuman has been working on a Neighborhood Watch program for North Oaks. He is working on an article for the February edition of North Oaks News that will outline how the program will work. An informational meeting is scheduled for Monday March 6th at 7 p.m. with Randy Gustafson and his team from the Ramsey County Sheriff's Office.
- Mayor Wolter noted that the City will be working with NOHOA over the coming months to better articulate City and NOHOA responsibilities, with the goal of providing more clarity to the community.

Late winter ideal time to prune trees

Pruning is a great way to prevent spread of diseases like oak wilt

Late winter is the ideal time to prune branches on trees, according to experts with the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources. When done correctly, pruning in the winter is less risky to tree health.

"Now through early March — just before trees come out of dormancy — is a great time to get outside and prune your trees," said Jennifer Teegarden, DNR cooperative forestry outreach specialist. "As trees become active in spring, they are able to quickly heal the pruning wound."

Wintertime pruning minimizes the risk that an open pruning wound could invite pests or diseases. Pruning oak trees should be avoided from April through July, when beetles that can spread oak wilt are feeding on tree sap, which is present at new wounds.

Tree pruning tips:

- Trim branches before they grow to 2 inches in diameter to minimize wound size and damage to the surrounding bark.
- Don't cut flush to the trunk. Preserving the branch collar (the area where the trunk slightly bulges around the branch) allows the wound to heal quickly and not decay.
- Use the three-cut method for larger branches to minimize damage to the bark. Information on this method and best practices for pruning trees can be found on the <u>pruning trees and shrubs</u> page of the University of Minnesota Extension website.

Pruning trees benefits yards and homes by:

- Reducing the need for a larger pruning job in the future and improving the tree's health.
- Helping trees survive storms with fewer dropped branches and less damage.
- Improving safety by removing branches that overhang or block walkways or roads.
- Maintaining the aesthetic of yards and enhancing the beauty of the tree.

Late winter ideal time to prune trees

Pruning is a great way to prevent spread of diseases like oak wilt

Late winter is the ideal time to prune branches on trees, according to experts with the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources. When done correctly, pruning in the winter is less risky to tree health.

"Now through early March — just before trees come out of dormancy — is a great time to get outside and prune your trees," said Jennifer Teegarden, DNR cooperative forestry outreach specialist. "As trees become active in spring, they are able to quickly heal the pruning wound."

Wintertime pruning minimizes the risk that an open pruning wound could invite pests or diseases. Pruning oak trees should be avoided from April through July, when beetles that can spread oak wilt are feeding on tree sap, which is present at new wounds.

Tree pruning tips:

• Trim branches before they grow to 2 inches in diameter to minimize wound size and damage to the surrounding bark.

- Don't cut flush to the trunk. Preserving the branch collar (the area where the trunk slightly bulges around the branch) allows the wound to heal quickly and not decay.
- Use the three-cut method for larger branches to minimize damage to the bark. Information on this method and best practices for pruning trees can be found on the <u>pruning trees and shrubs</u> page of the University of Minnesota Extension website.

Pruning trees benefits yards and homes by:

- Reducing the need for a larger pruning job in the future and improving the tree's health.
- Helping trees survive storms with fewer dropped branches and less damage.
- Improving safety by removing branches that overhang or block walkways or roads.
- Maintaining the aesthetic of yards and enhancing the beauty of the tree.

The City office is beginning to get calls inquiring when road restrictions will take effect. They are **NOT** currently in effect but you do need to plan ahead. The City of North Oaks follows the State of Minnesota Department of Transportation guidance. Spring road conditions are weather dependent and based on the impact to road surfaces while the ground thaws from winter. While the 3 ton per axle restriction typically has gone into effect early-March in the past, we only receive a 48-hour notice from MN DOT of the date/time when restrictions take effect.

If you are anticipating large contractor deliveries within the next 8-10 weeks, plan ahead now or delivery loads will need to be split into smaller trucks. The City of North Oaks follows the State of Minnesota Department of Transportation guidance. Spring road conditions are weather dependent and based on the impact to road surfaces while the ground thaws from winter. While the 3 ton per axle restriction typically has gone into effect early-March in the past, we only receive a 48-hour notice from MN DOT of the date/time when restrictions take effect.

As soon as we receive notice, we will publish this on the website, Facebook page, City eblast, North Oaks News, NOHOA eblast. If you are anticipating large contractor deliveries within the next 8-10 weeks, plan ahead now or delivery loads will need to be split into smaller trucks. Coyotes -Breeding season

As we enter the spring, Coyotes may become more active with the mating season beginning in January and lasting through February. Five to seven pups are typically born in April and may be protective of their young. Please keep a careful watch on your pets when they are outside and as always, please keep your pets leashed on trails. If Coyotes do encroach your yard, make them feel as unwelcome as possible using hazing techniques such as loud noises, and yelling to encourage them to move on.

Road restrictions are put in place to protect the integrity of road surfaces during the spring ground thaw. Larger loads will need to be split onto smaller trucks during this period. Plan ahead now.

There are NO exceptions to the road restrictions through the City during this period unless it is a surfacing septic system emergency. Any exemptions can only be granted by the North Oaks Homeowners Association under special circumstances. NOHOA can be reached at 651-792-7765. Violations of road restrictions are subject to ticketing during this period.

Carp Presentation

Additional partners in this project include St. Paul Regional Water Services and North Oaks Company. The main consultant leading the project is Carp Solutions.

How Minnesota Recycling Works

Have you ever questioned if recycling is worth it? Short answer: yes. Beyond saving energy and protecting natural resources, recycling also supports vital industries.

Recycling is the process of collecting materials that would otherwise be thrown away and turning them into new products. Our cans, bottles and paper are dropped off at a local facility where people and machines sort the

recycling into material types which are sent to many different companies:

- 1. **Paper and cardboard** are made into newspapers, toilet paper rolls and cereal boxes at five paper mills in Minnesota.
- 2. **Cartons** like juice boxes are sent to a company in Wisconsin that makes a material for new paper products.
- 3. Aluminum cans get turned into new cans, wire, siding and more at plants in the South.
- 4. **Steel cans** like those used for soup are made into steel beams in Chicago.
- 5. **Plastic bottles with a number 1 like water and soda bottles** are shipped to other states to be made into new bottles, deli food containers and carpet.
- 6. **Plastic containers with a number 2 like milk jugs** are transformed into low-maintenance lumber by companies like Avon Plastics in Paynesville. They are also made into more bottles or irrigation tubing for farmers.

- 7. **Cottage cheese and other plastic tubs with a number 5** are used to create food containers, car parts, paint cans and more by companies in other states.
- 8. **Glass bottles and jars** are sorted by color in Saint Paul. Clear glass goes to Anchor Glass in Shakopee to make condiment bottles. Brown glass is sent to Illinois to make beer bottles.

Recycling is wanted by many companies in our state and across the country. Help support local recycling business:

- 1. **Stick to the basics:** Recycle the items listed above.
- 2. **Keep it loose**: Empty recycling into your bin no plastic bags.
- 3. Check with your recycling hauler or Ramsey County (RamseyRecycles.com/AtoZ or 651-633-3279) for everything else.

Road Restrictions Are in Effect

Road restrictions went into effect beginning Friday, March 10th at 12:01 a.m. During this period the 3 ton per axle restriction will be in effect.

This period is determined by the MN Department of Transportation based on road conditions and typically lasts 4-5 weeks. Road restrictions are put in place to protect the integrity of road surfaces during the spring ground thaw. Larger loads will need to be split onto smaller trucks during this period. Plan ahead now.

There are NO exceptions to the road restrictions through the City during this period unless it is a surfacing septic system emergency. Any exemptions can only be granted by the North Oaks Homeowners Association under special circumstances. NOHOA can be reached at 651-792-7765. Violations of road restrictions are subject to ticketing during this period.

VLAWMO and NOHOA invite you to attend a presentation about the common carp removal project. Common carp is an invasive species in Minnesota that reduces water quality when these fish mix up the sediment, stirring it into the water column and releasing nutrients, and uproot aquatic plants. 2022 was

a very successful carp removal year for the project. Spring carp removal activities will be getting underway again in the coming weeks. We will provide an update on progress to date and explain upcoming activities.

Additional partners in this project include St. Paul Regional Water Services and North Oaks Company. The main consultant leading the project is Carp Solutions.

The presentation will be held in person on April 11, 6:30 pm, in the North Oaks Community Room at 100 Village Center Drive. We hope to see you there!

Ramsey County Recycling Guide

The Ramsey County Recycling Guide will hit resident mailboxes this week. There are additional copies at the City office, or simply click **HERE** for an easy searchable online disposal guide.

How Minnesota Recycling Works

Have you ever questioned if recycling is worth it? Short answer: yes. Beyond saving energy and

protecting natural resources, recycling also supports vital industries.

Recycling is the process of collecting materials that would otherwise be thrown away and turning them into new products. Our cans, bottles and paper are dropped off at a local facility where people and machines sort the recycling into material types which are sent to many different companies:

- Paper and cardboard are made into newspapers, toilet paper rolls and cereal boxes at five paper mills in Minnesota.
- Cartons like juice boxes are sent to a company in Wisconsin that makes a material for new paper products.
- Aluminum cans get turned into new cans, wire, siding and more at plants in the South.
- **Steel cans** like those used for soup are made into steel beams in Chicago.
- Plastic bottles with a number 1 like water and soda bottles are shipped to other states to be made into new bottles, deli food containers and carpet.
- Plastic containers with a number 2 like milk jugs are transformed into low-maintenance lumber by companies like Avon Plastics in Paynesville. They are also made into more bottles or irrigation tubing for farmers.
- Cottage cheese and other plastic tubs with a number 5 are used to create food containers, car parts, paint cans and more by companies in other states.
- Glass bottles and jars are sorted by color in Saint Paul. Clear glass goes to Anchor Glass in Shakopee to make condiment bottles. Brown glass is sent to Illinois to make beer bottles.

Recycling is wanted by many companies in our state and across the country. Help support local recycling business:

- **Stick to the basics:** Recycle the items listed above.
- **Keep it loose**: Empty recycling into your bin no plastic bags.

Highlights from the Special Planning Commission Meeting / Public Hearing - April 12th

- Commissioner Nick Sandell was appointed as Vice Chair for the Planning Commission.
- Planning Commission recommended approval for a comprehensive plan amendment to amend
 City of North Oaks 2040 Comprehensive Plan to add additional properties within the Red Forest
 Way South development for future municipal sewer and water service. City staff will explore this
 issue further with the Met Council, and City Council will consider the proposal for final approval
 at a future meeting.
- Planning Commission approved Resolution No. 2023-1 that determined that the application for property subdivision (Preliminary Plan Approval) for Subdivision of RLS 640, Tract R, Red Forest Way South Phase 2 is complete. The application will be considered for compliance and recommendation for approval or denial at a future meeting.

- Planning Commission gave approval for City Staff to bring several ordinance amendments to the Commission for consideration at upcoming meetings. City Planner Lindahl spoke on the standard phases of the Municipal planning process including:

 Overall goals for planning process, importance of guiding documents such as the comprehensive plan, zoning and subdivision ordinances, the Conditional use permit and Variance process, and the importance of the 60-day rule.

Highlights from the City Council Meeting - April 13th

- Consent agenda approved including City financials, arborist and mechanical Licenses, City
 Council meeting minutes of 2.27.23 and 3.9.23, and the annual contract with the Human Society
 of Woodbury as the resource for Ramsey County Sheriff Animal Control.
- Sheriff Deputy Lassegard shared his monthly report, along with guidance to keep red mailbox flags down to secure outgoing checks, removing food sources to keep bears/coyote away, and noted the red flag warning for no burning at this time. If there is a vulnerable adult in the community please let him know at <u>Matt.Lassegard@CO.RAMSEY.MN.US</u>. His full report can be found in the 4.13.2023 City Council meeting packet.

- Fire Chief Tim Boehkle provided an update on year 2022 fire department alarm calls and future plans. There were 581 calls in North Oaks last year, with 75% of them EMS calls. There are 85 part-time fire fighters serving the cities of North Oaks, Shoreview, and Arden Hills as part of the joint service agreement. They are seeing a demand for staffing among multiple agencies, and they are looking to hire additional full-time staff to cover gaps. Discussions will continue regarding employee retention as well as long-term funding of resources and stations.
- Geoffrey Mass from Ramsey County presented on their services and imagery used by the Ramsey County assessor's office. They are requesting of Council and NOHOA, to consider allowing them to take street view imagery in our community. Follow up conversations to take place regarding concerns of security of data, who would have access, public security, authority and if a true need for this information.
- Vadnais Lake Area Water Management Organization (VLAWMO) presented on the upcoming Wilkinson Water Quality project. Council authorized the City Administrator to formally draft a letter of approval of the project.
- Council approved lowest bid for the Charley Lake Townhomes Association Shoreview water connection project. Authorized City to move forward discussions with contractor and potentially start construction in the fall/winter 2023. There was discussion of funding cost, size of pipe and potential for connecting other homes in future.
- Two bids have been received from Engineer firms to put together a North Oaks Master Infrastructure Plan looking at the long term needs of the community. The goal is to have all firms that solicited bids present to Council prior to the next May Council meeting.
- Council authorized a switch to from H.R. Green to Sambatek as the City Engineer.

Report Fish Die-Offs to DNR

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources encourages Minnesotans to contact the state duty officer if they see evidence of a fish die-off in a lake or stream. Fish die-offs can result from a variety of natural and human causes.

"People can help by reporting fish die-offs right away," DNR Limnology Consultant Tom Burri said. "These reports alert state agencies to the situation and help us determine appropriate next steps."

To report fish die-offs, people should call the Minnesota duty officer at 651-649-5451 or 800-422-0798 (the officer line is available 24 hours per day, seven days a week). An early report allows timely water and fish sampling or other response actions, if needed. It's especially helpful to know what sizes and types of fish people see in a fish die-off.

In early spring, the retreat of lake and stream ice can sometimes leave behind fish that died during ice cover, commonly referred to as winterkill. When snow and ice cover a lake, sunlight reaching aquatic plants is limited. The plants, in turn, reduce the amount of oxygen they produce. If vegetation dies from lack of sunlight or other cause, the plants start to decompose, which uses the limited oxygen that is dissolved in the water. If oxygen depletion becomes severe enough, fish die.

In mid-spring and summer, fish die-offs are often the result of warming water and opportunistic infections that spread in fish populations that are already stressed after the spawning season. Species commonly observed in these die-offs include sunfish, crappies and bullheads, and, occasionally, largemouth bass and northern pike.

When die-offs of wild fish are the result of disease issues, the affected fish tend to be of a single species and size range. By contrast, when die-offs include multiple species and size ranges, human activity is more likely to be the cause.

Human causes of fish kills can include water discharged at high temperatures; discharges or spills of toxic chemicals, including pesticides and fertilizers; manure runoff; and low oxygen levels in a lake resulting from storm water that runs off urban or rural landscapes. Often, there are multiple causes contributing to fish deaths.

Highlights from the City Council Meeting – April 13th

- Consent agenda approved including City financials, arborist and mechanical Licenses, City
 Council meeting minutes of 2.27.23 and 3.9.23, and the annual contract with the Human Society
 of Woodbury as the resource for Ramsey County Sheriff Animal Control.
- Sheriff Deputy Lassegard shared his monthly report, along with guidance to keep red mailbox flags down to secure outgoing checks, removing food sources to keep bears/coyote away, and noted the red flag warning for no burning at this time. If there is a vulnerable adult in the community please let him know at <u>Matt.Lassegard@CO.RAMSEY.MN.US</u>. His full report can be found in the 4.13.2023 City Council meeting packet.
- Fire Chief Tim Boehkle provided an update on year 2022 fire department alarm calls and future plans. There were 581 calls in North Oaks last year, with 75% of them EMS calls. There are 85 part-time fire fighters serving the cities of North Oaks, Shoreview, and Arden Hills as part of the joint service agreement. They are seeing a demand for staffing among multiple agencies, and they are looking to hire additional full-time staff to cover gaps. Discussions will continue regarding employee retention as well as long-term funding of resources and stations.

- Geoffrey Mass from Ramsey County presented on their services and imagery used by the Ramsey County assessor's office. They are requesting of Council and NOHOA, to consider allowing them to take street view imagery in our community. Follow up conversations to take place regarding concerns of security of data, who would have access, public security, authority and if a true need for this information.
- Vadnais Lake Area Water Management Organization (VLAWMO) presented on the upcoming Wilkinson Water Quality project. Council authorized the City Administrator to formally draft a letter of approval of the project.
- Council approved lowest bid for the Charley Lake Townhomes Association Shoreview water connection project. Authorized City to move forward discussions with contractor and potentially start construction in the fall/winter 2023. There was discussion of funding cost, size of pipe and potential for connecting other homes in future.
- Two bids have been received from Engineer firms to put together a North Oaks Master Infrastructure Plan looking at the long term needs of the community. The goal is to have all firms that solicited bids present to Council prior to the next May Council meeting.



Cold Water Safety

With the lake ice gone, it is important to remember that the cold water in lakes, rivers and ponds is very dangerous and unexpected falls can quickly turn tragic due to the impact of cold water on the body. When boaters and paddlers are on early season open water, they should:

- Wear a foam-filled life jacket (inflatable life jackets might not fully inflate when the water is cold). Anyone on the ice should wear a foam life jacket or float coat and carry ice picks.
- Ensure their watercraft is registered and equipped with proper safety equipment, and that all equipment is functioning properly.
- Distribute weight evenly and abide by manufacturers' weight limits to reduce the likelihood of falling overboard.
- Have a means of communication and ensure someone knows where they're going and when they plan to return.
- Watch the weather to avoid shifting winds or storms.

Spring burning restrictions set to begin in Ramsey County May 1st

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources is again restricting open burning due to increased wildfire risk due to predicted warm temperatures and dry conditions in central Minnesota. Beginning

Monday, May 1st, the restrictions apply in the following counties: Anoka, Chisago, Isanti, Hennepin, Ramsey, Washington.

The DNR will not issue permits for the open burning brush or yard waste in these counties until restrictions are lifted. Wildfire risk increases each year after the snow melts and before vegetation greens up, therefore spring burning restrictions help to reduce the number of wildfires, especially those caused by debris burning.

Please consider using alternatives to burning for disposing of yard waste, such as composting, chipping, or taking brush to a collection site. Mosquito Control season has begun!

The Metropolitan Mosquito Control District (MMCD) will be conducting surveillance and treatment activities in our community to reduce the risk of disease and annoyance in an environmentally-sensitive manner. Each year field staff at MMCD monitors and treats wetlands that breed mosquitoes with a fleet of trucks and helicopters. Many of the seasonal staff begin working in April and you may notice the green or white trucks with the MMCD logo or staff on bikes or on foot wearing brightly colored "Mosquito Control" shirts.

Some of the activities that MMCD may be doing include:

- Wetland surveillance determining if ponds or swamps have mosquito larvae present.
- Catch basin surveillance pulling off grates and inspecting neighborhood catch basins to determine if mosquito larvae are present.
- Ground larval treatments applying control materials to a wetland with a hand spreader or backpack.
- Helicopter larval treatments applying control materials to a wetland via helicopter.
- Catch basin treatments applying control materials to neighborhood catch basins.
- Setting or collecting traps surveillance helps MMCD determine where and what types of mosquitoes are active.

Sewer / Water Bill - Escrow Fund

For residents on City water and/or sewer, you may have noticed an increase in the escrow fee on your recent quarterly invoice. The escrow fund includes a charge of \$30 for sewer and \$45 for water per quarter. Residents utilizing services through Shoreview and White Bear Township are charged the same. The escrow fund is designed to pay for regular maintenance of infrastructure such as lift stations, pumps, piping, etc. After a Utility Rate Study was conducted and approved by Council, it was determined that the City is consistently underfunded in this area and needed to increase rates to cover these expenses. Funding this escrow account in small quarterly intervals should eliminate the need for any large unexpected special assessments to residents in the future.

Road Restrictions have been Lifted

A reminder of the news many have been waiting for – we received notice from the Minnesota Department of Transportation that ground conditions allowed for road restrictions to be lifted effective this past Monday, April 24th.

Cold Water Safety

With the lake ice gone, it is important to remember that the cold water in lakes, rivers and ponds is very dangerous and unexpected falls can quickly turn tragic due to the impact of cold water on the body. When boaters and paddlers are on early season open water, they should:

- Wear a foam-filled life jacket (inflatable life jackets might not fully inflate when the water is cold). Anyone on the ice should wear a foam life jacket or float coat and carry ice picks.
- Ensure their watercraft is registered and equipped with proper safety equipment, and that all equipment is functioning properly.
- Distribute weight evenly and abide by manufacturers' weight limits to reduce the likelihood of falling overboard.
- Have a means of communication and ensure someone knows where they're going and when they plan to return.
- Watch the weather to avoid shifting winds or storms.

Spring burning restrictions set to begin in Ramsey County May 1st

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources is again restricting open burning due to increased wildfire risk due to predicted warm temperatures and dry conditions in central Minnesota. Beginning

Monday, May 1st, the restrictions apply in the following counties: Anoka, Chisago, Isanti, Hennepin, Ramsey, Washington.

The DNR will not issue permits for the open burning brush or yard waste in these counties until restrictions are lifted. Wildfire risk increases each year after the snow melts and before vegetation greens up, therefore spring burning restrictions help to reduce the number of wildfires, especially those caused by debris burning.

Please consider using alternatives to burning for disposing of yard waste, such as composting, chipping, or taking brush to a collection site. For more information, visit the <u>composting for woodland owners</u> <u>page of the DNR website</u> (mndnr.gov/wildfire/prevention/debris-composting.html). Mosquito Control season has begun!

The Metropolitan Mosquito Control District (MMCD) will be conducting surveillance and treatment activities in our community to reduce the risk of disease and annoyance in an environmentally-sensitive manner. Each year field staff at MMCD monitors and treats wetlands that breed mosquitoes with a fleet of trucks and helicopters. Many of the seasonal staff begin working in April and you may notice the green or white trucks with the MMCD logo or staff on bikes or on foot wearing brightly colored "Mosquito Control" shirts.

Some of the activities that MMCD may be doing include:

- Wetland surveillance determining if ponds or swamps have mosquito larvae present.
- Catch basin surveillance pulling off grates and inspecting neighborhood catch basins to determine if mosquito larvae are present.
- Ground larval treatments applying control materials to a wetland with a hand spreader or backpack.
- Helicopter larval treatments applying control materials to a wetland via helicopter.
- Catch basin treatments applying control materials to neighborhood catch basins.
- Setting or collecting traps surveillance helps MMCD determine where and what types of mosquitoes are active.

IMPORTANT UPDATES

Special City Council Meeting - Long Term Strategy Introductions - Tuesday, May 9th

Highlights from the Special City Council meeting include:

- Engineering Firms H.R. Green, TKDA, and WSB presented to the City Council on their proposals for creating a master utility and infrastructure long-term plan for our community.
- A consistent set of questions was asked to each firm.
- Two other Engineer Firms are expected to present their proposals in late May.
- A joint meeting with NOHOA will be scheduled once the firms under consideration have been narrowed down.
- Informational session only, there were no motions or decisions were made.

Planning Commission Public Hearing – Wednesday, May 10th

Highlights Include:

- Commissioners reviewed the Preliminary Plat subdivision application for 17 single family home sites known as Red Forest Way South. There were no resident comments during the public hearing. The application was recommended for approval up to the City Council.
- Commissioners will review two Ordinances as part of a Public Hearing to take place at the next Planning Commission meeting on June 22nd. The proposed changes include revisions to: 1) Chapter 34 Planning Commission composition and responsibilities, and 2) Chapter 151 Zoning Ordinance and Comprehensive Plan. The proposed red-lined changes can be viewed as part of the 5.10.2023 Planning Commission Packet.
- Commissioners agreed to shift the next regular Planning Commission meeting up one week to June 22nd to enable all Commissioners to attend.

Residents can watch the Planning Commission meeting <u>HERE</u>, however it has been noted that there was an issue with the audio volume being low on the Broadcast recording. The conversation can be heard more clearly on the zoom recording <u>HERE</u>.

Highlights from the Regular City Council meeting Thursday, May 11th

- Bill Long from the NOHOA Board gave an update. The NOHOA Board is in the final stages of
 analysis on proposals from management companies to take over some responsibilities for the
 Homeowner's Association. They are down to two companies for consideration and they hope to
 have a decision by June 1st. They also have Summerfest coming up for the community on June
 3rd
- Deputy Lassegard gave a report on crime in the area, including financial scams under the guise of borrowing a phone to call for assistance for a broken-down car, catalytic converter thefts, and some solicitation trespassing. He has been noticing some more speeding as the weather has turned warmer, and encouraged drivers to maintain safe speeds for the safety of the community. He also gave a brief report on a burglary that occurred in the 100 block of West Pleasant Lake Road. He noted that it is an ongoing investigation, and clarified that there was no drug activity at the scene. Crime Prevention Deputy Alicia Ouellette from Ramsey County Crime Prevention joined Deputy Lassegard to give a report on the number of burglaries in recent years, noting that there were 5 in 2022 and 5 in 2021. She stated that some of this comes from theft at the job sites of new homes being built, where thieves are looking for metals or

dumpster diving. She emphasized that there is no pattern of snowbirds being targeted specifically, but encouraged residents to be cautious when leaving their homes unattended. Residents can proactively contact the Ramsey County Sheriff's office to request "House Checks" free of charge from Community Affairs volunteers, work with private home watch companies, and communicate with neighbors when they plan to be away. Deputy Ouellete also added that Ramsey County dispatch has also added a social worker who can assist with mental health issues from any calls. City Councilors requested information be shared more regularly and in a timelier manner with residents in order to keep them better informed on crime in the area.

- Consistent with the Federal and State Government and surrounding cities, City Council voted to terminate the local emergency declaration that was adopted during COVID.
- The 2022 Audit was accepted into record with no notable issues.
- White Bear Township Water Memorandum of Understanding was discussed dealing with the White Bear Lake water lawsuit.
- City Council voted to allow the release of the existing letters of credit and cash escrow to combine into a single new letter of credit as part of the East Oaks PDA.
- Mayor Wolter presented an idea for a quarterly newsletter that would be sent to residents via
 postal mail. This newsletter would include updates from the City, NOHOA and other local
 stakeholders such as the Hill Farm Historical Society, the Golf Club, etc. This piece would be paid
 for by sponsors, although would not include advertisements. Council voted to allow the Mayor
 and City Administrator Kress to move forward with developing this idea.

Carp Removal Activity - This weekend

The Vadnais Lake Area Water Management Association (VLAWMO) and their authorized contractor Carp Solutions will have two individuals working in the area of the Crescent Lane gate / boardwalk / trail. Carp removal efforts are part of ongoing efforts to improve water quality.

This activity is authorized by the City and North Oaks Homeowners Association. Depending on timing of the carp aggregation, they may need to briefly access the trail overnight, and then return in the morning for removal. Please give these individuals space to work if you see them on the trail.

Last Week for Signup: Brush Pickup Day Coming - May 25th

The City and NOHOA are co-hosting and coordinating a brush pickup for interested residents. This is a great opportunity for a 1-time easy pickup of all the brush/tree limbs that have gathering from the winter. Brush Pickup Day is Thursday, May 25th, 2023. If all the brush is not picked up that day, work will continue the following day. The estimated cost for a dumpster size load of brush (14ft X 7.5ft X 3.5 ft and equals 10 cubic yards) is \$140, but rates vary depending on the amount of brush.

Budget Tree Service will be doing the work, with the assistance of the City Forester to answer resident questions. For ease of pick up, we ask that branches be place "end side" towards the street along the road and not under any power lines. If you are interested in signing up for this service, please <u>review the letter for pricing detail and instructions</u>, and <u>return the waiver</u> to the City office via email <u>northoaks@northoaksmn.gov</u>, or stopping **by the City office by May 23rd**.

For those 15 residents already signed up for pickup, you'll receive a reminder / confirmation email on Monday May 22^{nd} – a few days prior to the pickup. If you do NOT receive this reminder email and have sent in your form, please contact City Hall at 651-792-7750 to make sure you are on the list.

Pedestrian safety is a responsibility shared by drivers and pedestrians. When drivers maintain safe speeds and practice other safe driving behaviors, safer walking environments are created for you, your loved ones, and others in your community. When pedestrians maintain awareness of their surroundings and practice safe behaviors it helps everyone.

Know the Basics—Pedestrian Safety 8 Safety Tips for Drivers

- Look out for pedestrians everywhere, at all times.
- Use extra caution when driving in hard-to-see conditions, such as nighttime or bad weather.
- Slow down and be prepared to stop when turning or otherwise entering a crosswalk.
- Yield to pedestrians in crosswalks and stop well back from the crosswalk to give other vehicles an opportunity to see the crossing pedestrians so they can stop too.
- Never pass vehicles stopped at a crosswalk. There may be people crossing where you can't see.
- Never drive under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs.
- Follow the speed limit, especially around people on the street, in school zones and in neighborhoods where children are present.
- Be extra cautious when backing up and look for pedestrians.

8 Walking Safety Tips

- Follow the rules of the road and obey signs and signals.
- Walk on sidewalks whenever they are available.
- If there is no sidewalk, walk facing traffic and as far from traffic as possible.
- Cross streets at crosswalks or intersections. Look for cars in all directions, including those turning left or right.
- If a crosswalk or intersection is not available, locate a well-lit area where you have the best view of traffic. Wait for a gap in traffic that allows enough time to cross safely; continue watching for traffic as you cross.
- Watch for cars entering or exiting driveways or backing up in parking lots.
- Avoid alcohol and drugs when walking; they impair your abilities and your judgment.
- Embrace walking as a healthy form of transportation get up, get out and get moving.

DNR urges people to Leave Deer Fawns Alone

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources asks that people avoid disturbing or touching deer fawns, which are born around this time of year.

Most fawns are born in mid-May to mid-June, and fawns do not attempt to evade predators during their first few weeks of life. Instead, they remain still to avoid being seen. During these times, fawns are learning critical survival skills from their mothers but are often left on their own while their mothers forage watchfully nearby.

Be assured deer fawns are likely fine even if they look abandoned or fragile. Even if the fawn is known to be wounded or abandoned due to car strike or animal attack, do not transport it without talking to a wildlife rehabilitator. White Bear/Shoreview Water Sprinkling and Irrigation Restrictions - Begin May 15th

There are several sources of water service that is provided to those in our North Oaks community. If your home is on Shoreview or White Bear Lake Township water, please abide by any watering restrictions that are in place for watering lawns. Both White Bear Township and Shoreview may assess penalties for violation of their watering restrictions.

Shoreview water restrictions are in effect from May 15th – September 15th and allows irrigation for even numbered house addresses on even numbered calendar days before 11 a.m. or after 5 p.m. Odd numbered house addresses may irrigate only on odd numbered calendar days before 11 a.m. or after 5 p.m. Learn more about watering restrictions for Shoreview Water.

White Bear Township allows irrigation for even numbered house addresses on even numbered calendar days from 6:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. Odd numbered house addresses may irrigate only on odd numbered calendar days from 6:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. Learn more about water restrictions for White Bear Township.

For those on private wells, for most efficient watering and preservation of resources, we encourage you to water your lawn during the overnight hours to limit evaporation during the hot summer season and make best use of our natural resources.

State park Activities

From Minnesota DNR

In advance of the upcoming Memorial Day weekend, the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources is highlighting recreational opportunities at state parks, trails and recreation areas throughout Minnesota. The DNR's <u>summer activities guide</u> (mndnr.gov/summerguide) is a great place to start planning a state parks and trails adventure. The guide lists warm weather activities for people of all ages and interests. "Many people know about common activities at state parks and trails like hiking and camping, but we offer so much more," said Ann Pierce, the DNR's Parks and Trails Division director. "We encourage people to explore the DNR website to learn about all the activities available within the state parks and trails system."

Nature walks and campfire talks

State parks offer events and programs led by interpretive naturalists. Participants can learn about wildlife, plants, night skies, park history, outdoor skills and more. There's no cost to attend naturalist events, but some require reservations. Check the <u>online events calendar</u> (mndnr.gov/ptcalendar) for a full list of programming.

Plan a picnic

There are 60 locations within the state parks and trails system with picnic shelters, and even more with picnic areas. The DNR's guide on how to picnic like a pro (mndnr.gov/picnic/index.html) provides picnic location suggestions and can help visitors learn what to pack, find games to play, and get campfire cooking recipes.

Walk, pedal and roll on state trails

Minnesota offers more than 1,300 miles of state trails. Many state trails are paved, making them a great option for bikers, in-line skaters, and people using wheelchairs or strollers. State trails do not require a vehicle permit. Find trail maps on the DNR's <u>state trails webpage</u> (mndnr.gov/trails).

Borrow equipment to try a new activity

Most state parks and recreation areas offer free loaner equipment so visitors can try a new activity before purchasing their own gear. Fishing kits, birding kits, kids' discovery kits and GPS units are available on a first come, first served basis at select park offices. Find where equipment is available to borrow on the DNR's loaner equipment webpage (mndnr.gov/state_parks/loaner.html).

Enjoy the water

Minnesota is known for water recreation, and paddling is a popular activity. To learn about state water trails for a paddling trip, visit the DNR's <u>water trails webpage</u> (mndnr.gov/canoeing). More than 30 state parks offer rentals, including canoes, kayaks and stand-up paddleboards. Life jackets are included with rentals. In addition, state parks are home to hundreds of lakes and many swimming beaches perfect for a day of play or relaxation. Use the <u>ParkFinder tool</u> (mndnr.gov/parkfinder) to find state parks with swimming beaches and rentals.

Limited camping reservations available

As of Thursday, May 18, 95% of available camping and lodging in state parks and recreation areas is fully booked for Memorial Day weekend. People looking for a camping reservation will find the most openings in northwestern Minnesota. Locations with more than 10 available campsites include Franz Jevne, Lake Bronson and Zippel Bay state parks and Red River State Recreation Area.

Campers who don't have a reservation can consider state forest campgrounds, where all campsites are available on a first come, first served basis. Find these campgrounds on the DNR's <u>camping in Minnesota state forests webpage</u> (mndnr.gov/state_forests/camping.html).

Check visitor alerts before leaving home

Special City Council Meeting – Long Term Strategy Introductions – Tuesday, May 9th

Highlights from the Special City Council meeting include:

- Engineering Firms H.R. Green, TKDA, and WSB presented to the City Council on their proposals for creating a master utility and infrastructure long-term plan for our community.
- A consistent set of questions was asked to each firm.
- Two other Engineer Firms are expected to present their proposals in late May.
- A joint meeting with NOHOA will be scheduled once the firms under consideration have been narrowed down.
- Informational session only, there were no motions or decisions were made.

<u>Planning Commission Public Hearing – Wednesday, May 10th</u>

Highlights Include:

- Commissioners reviewed the Preliminary Plat subdivision application for 17 single family home sites known as Red Forest Way South. There were no resident comments during the public hearing. The application was recommended for approval up to the City Council.
- Commissioners will review two Ordinances as part of a Public Hearing to take place at the next Planning Commission meeting on June 22nd. The proposed changes include revisions to: 1) Chapter 34 Planning Commission composition and responsibilities, and 2) Chapter 151 Zoning Ordinance and Comprehensive Plan. The proposed red-lined changes can be viewed as part of the 5.10.2023 Planning Commission Packet.

• Commissioners agreed to shift the next regular Planning Commission meeting up one week to June 22nd to enable all Commissioners to attend.

Residents can watch the Planning Commission meeting <u>HERE</u>, however it has been noted that there was an issue with the audio volume being low on the Broadcast recording. The conversation can be heard more clearly on the zoom recording <u>HERE</u>.

Highlights from the Regular City Council meeting Thursday, May 11th

- Bill Long from the NOHOA Board gave an update. The NOHOA Board is in the final stages of
 analysis on proposals from management companies to take over some responsibilities for the
 Homeowner's Association. They are down to two companies for consideration and they hope to
 have a decision by June 1st. They also have Summerfest coming up for the community on June
 3rd.
- Deputy Lassegard gave a report on crime in the area, including financial scams under the guise of borrowing a phone to call for assistance for a broken-down car, catalytic converter thefts, and some solicitation trespassing. He has been noticing some more speeding as the weather has turned warmer, and encouraged drivers to maintain safe speeds for the safety of the community. He also gave a brief report on a burglary that occurred in the 100 block of West Pleasant Lake Road. He noted that it is an ongoing investigation, and clarified that there was no drug activity at the scene. Crime Prevention Deputy Alicia Ouellette from Ramsey County Crime Prevention joined Deputy Lassegard to give a report on the number of burglaries in recent years, noting that there were 5 in 2022 and 5 in 2021. She stated that some of this comes from theft at the job sites of new homes being built, where thieves are looking for metals or dumpster diving. She emphasized that there is no pattern of snowbirds being targeted specifically, but encouraged residents to be cautious when leaving their homes unattended. Residents can proactively contact the Ramsey County Sheriff's office to request "House Checks" free of charge from Community Affairs volunteers, work with private home watch companies, and communicate with neighbors when they plan to be away. Deputy Ouellete also added that Ramsey County dispatch has also added a social worker who can assist with mental health issues from any calls. City Councilors requested information be shared more regularly and in a timelier manner with residents in order to keep them better informed on crime in the area.
- Consistent with the Federal and State Government and surrounding cities, City Council voted to terminate the local emergency declaration that was adopted during COVID.
- The 2022 Audit was accepted into record with no notable issues.
- White Bear Township Water Memorandum of Understanding was discussed dealing with the White Bear Lake water lawsuit.
- City Council voted to allow the release of the existing letters of credit and cash escrow to combine into a single new letter of credit as part of the East Oaks PDA.
- Mayor Wolter presented an idea for a quarterly newsletter that would be sent to residents via
 postal mail. This newsletter would include updates from the City, NOHOA and other local
 stakeholders such as the Hill Farm Historical Society, the Golf Club, etc. This piece would be paid
 for by sponsors, although would not include advertisements. Council voted to allow the Mayor
 and City Administrator Kress to move forward with developing this idea.

Pedestrian Safety

Pedestrian safety is a responsibility shared by drivers and pedestrians. When drivers maintain safe speeds and practice other safe driving behaviors, safer walking environments are created for you, your loved ones, and others in your community. When pedestrians maintain awareness of their surroundings and practice safe behaviors it helps everyone.

Know the Basics—Pedestrian Safety

8 Safety Tips for Drivers

- Look out for pedestrians everywhere, at all times.
- Use extra caution when driving in hard-to-see conditions, such as nighttime or bad weather.
- Slow down and be prepared to stop when turning or otherwise entering a crosswalk.
- Yield to pedestrians in crosswalks and stop well back from the crosswalk to give other vehicles an opportunity to see the crossing pedestrians so they can stop too.
- Never pass vehicles stopped at a crosswalk. There may be people crossing where you can't see.
- Never drive under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs.
- Follow the speed limit, especially around people on the street, in school zones and in neighborhoods where children are present.
- Be extra cautious when backing up and look for pedestrians.

8 Walking Safety Tips

- Follow the rules of the road and obey signs and signals.
- Walk on sidewalks whenever they are available.
- If there is no sidewalk, walk facing traffic and as far from traffic as possible.
- Cross streets at crosswalks or intersections. Look for cars in all directions, including those turning left or right.
- If a crosswalk or intersection is not available, locate a well-lit area where you have the best view of traffic. Wait for a gap in traffic that allows enough time to cross safely; continue watching for traffic as you cross.
- Watch for cars entering or exiting driveways or backing up in parking lots.

- Avoid alcohol and drugs when walking; they impair your abilities and your judgment.
- Embrace walking as a healthy form of transportation get up, get out and get moving.

DNR urges people to Leave Deer Fawns Alone

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources asks that people avoid disturbing or touching deer fawns, which are born around this time of year.

Most fawns are born in mid-May to mid-June, and fawns do not attempt to evade predators during their first few weeks of life. Instead, they remain still to avoid being seen. During these times, fawns are learning critical survival skills from their mothers but are often left on their own while their mothers forage watchfully nearby.

Be assured deer fawns are likely fine even if they look abandoned or fragile. Even if the fawn is known to be wounded or abandoned due to car strike or animal attack, do not transport it without talking to a wildlife rehabilitator. Ordinance § 90.15 states: "Any animal shall be deemed to be under control if it is on the premises of its owner; on the premises of another owner of property with the property owner's permission; if on a leash held by a person able to physically restrain the animal; or if suitably trained to respond to audible or other signals and accompanied by a person within the range of trained response when on public or easement property".

Homeowners Association regulations require pets be leashed on our NOHOA trails and recreation spaces. Residents have varying levels of comfort with off leash animals. For the safety of others and their own leashed pets, please keep your pet leashed in our shared public spaces to ensure all residents have the ability to comfortably use these spaces.

From Minnesota DNR

In advance of the upcoming Memorial Day weekend, the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources is highlighting recreational opportunities at state parks, trails and recreation areas throughout Minnesota. The DNR's <u>summer activities guide</u> (mndnr.gov/summerguide) is a great place to start planning a state parks and trails adventure. The guide lists warm weather activities for people of all ages and interests. "Many people know about common activities at state parks and trails like hiking and camping, but we offer so much more," said Ann Pierce, the DNR's Parks and Trails Division director. "We encourage people to explore the DNR website to learn about all the activities available within the state parks and trails system."

Nature walks and campfire talks

State parks offer events and programs led by interpretive naturalists. Participants can learn about wildlife, plants, night skies, park history, outdoor skills and more. Plan a picnic

There are 60 locations within the state parks and trails system with picnic shelters, and even more with picnic areas. The DNR's guide on how to picnic like a pro (mndnr.gov/picnic/index.html) provides picnic location suggestions and can help visitors learn what to pack, find games to play, and get campfire cooking recipes.

Walk, pedal and roll on state trails

Minnesota offers more than 1,300 miles of state trails. Many state trails are paved, making them a great option for bikers, in-line skaters, and people using wheelchairs or strollers. State trails do not require a vehicle permit. Find trail maps on the DNR's <u>state trails webpage</u> (mndnr.gov/trails).

Borrow equipment to try a new activity

Most state parks and recreation areas offer free loaner equipment so visitors can try a new activity before purchasing their own gear. Fishing kits, birding kits, kids' discovery kits and GPS units are available on a first come, first served basis at select park offices. Enjoy the water

Minnesota is known for water recreation, and paddling is a popular activity. To learn about state water trails for a paddling trip, visit the DNR's <u>water trails webpage</u> (mndnr.gov/canoeing). More than 30 state

parks offer rentals, including canoes, kayaks and stand-up paddleboards. Life jackets are included with rentals. In addition, state parks are home to hundreds of lakes and many swimming beaches perfect for a day of play or relaxation. Use the ParkFinder tool (mndnr.gov/parkfinder) to find state parks with swimming beaches and rentals.

Limited camping reservations available

As of Thursday, May 18, 95% of available camping and lodging in state parks and recreation areas is fully booked for Memorial Day weekend. People looking for a camping reservation will find the most openings in northwestern Minnesota. Locations with more than 10 available campsites include Franz Jevne, Lake Bronson and Zippel Bay state parks and Red River State Recreation Area.

Campers who don't have a reservation can consider state forest campgrounds, where all campsites are available on a first come, first served basis. Find these campgrounds on the DNR's <u>camping in Minnesota</u> state forests webpage (mndnr.gov/state forests/camping.html).

- Council reviewed the request for Comprehensive plan amendment to update maps 1, 16, 17, 18
 to allow water and sewer option for 33 new single-family home lots being platted in the Red
 Forest Way South area. Motion was unanimously approved. Discussions will take place with Met
 Council and White Bear Lake regarding this matter.
- Discussion and possible action on Age-Friendly Minnesota Community Grant. The City has been awarded a \$22,000 grant by the State of Minnesota. Discussion took place on what may be

- considered eligible activities under the given guidelines of "developing age-friendly projects and make Minnesota an age-friendly place to live". Motion approved to table discussion of further ideas to next Thursday's Council meeting.
- Discussion with City Council, NOHOA and North Oaks Company on planning efforts to develop a
 future Comprehensive City Master Infrastructure plan. This planning effort is to promote
 collaboration to ensure water, sewer, stormwater, water quality, sustainability, and roads are in
 position for the long-term future of community.

Best Watering Practices

With the current dry conditions, reminder that watering should NOT take place in the heat of the daytime hours to minimize evaporation and make best use of our natural resources.

Those on Shoreview and White Bear Lake water must follow the even/odd address day watering restrictions. On your assigned day, White Bear water residents can water between 6 a.m. – 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. – 10 p.m., with Shoreview water requiring residents to water only before 11 a.m. and after 5 p.m. Click the links above for full information.

Other watering tips (from City of Shoreview Water Restriction webpage):

When Should I Water?

- Watering twice a week is usually enough to keep a healthy lawn growing.
- Your lawn needs about one inch of water per week, including rainfall, to keep it green during the growing season.
- Water only when your lawn needs it, rather than on a set schedule.
- One sign that a lawn needs water is when it lacks enough moisture to spring back after you walk on it. If it stays flat, it's time to water.
- Water deeply and infrequently. Deep watering promotes a deep root system, while overwatering promotes shallow root growth, making your lawn less hardy.

Phone Scams – 10 Things You Can Do to Avoid Fraud

The call sounds real – a loved one is in trouble, you owe taxes, an arrest warrant has been issued, you won a large sum of money, your utilities are being cut off, your financial status is in jeopardy, etc. Could this be a scam? Quick litmus test:

- 1. Is this call the first time that you heard about this problem with this government agency?
- 2. Are you required to act immediately?
- 3. What is the method of payment is it by wiring money, using a gift card or a cash reload card? If the answer is yes to any of these questions it is most likely a scam.

Crooks use clever schemes to defraud millions of people every year. They often combine new technology with old tricks to get people to send money or give out personal information. The thief's goal is to get your money as quickly as possible in a way that makes it hard to trace them, and hard for you to get your money back.

Here are some practical tips to help you stay a step ahead and not fall victim. If you are victim who lost money to a scam call 9-1-1 to file a report.

IMPORTANT UPDATES

Special City Council Meeting – Wednesday, July 12

Highlights from the Special City Council meeting include:

- Infrastructure Master Planning effort City Administrator Kress shared a list of potential projects that the City and NOHOA could work on to improve community infrastructure. The goal of the list is to identify key areas of focus for the Master Infrastructure Plan, and other items that can be pulled off as side projects. Once Councilors select an engineer for the project, they will prioritize which items to include in the plan. Councilors authorized City Administrator Kress to request a scope of work on the Master Infrastructure Plan from the engineering firm Sambatek as a finalist for the project.
- Acceptable driveway materials for surfacing City Administrator Kress explained that the current ordinance stipulates that driveways must be made of concrete, bituminous material or an approved equivalent suitable to control dust and drainage. He felt the wording of the ordinance was broad and requested that the council provide some guidance on how to interpret the ordinance and what materials are acceptable. Councilors agreed that in the case of long driveways, a concrete or bituminous material pad up close home is preferred, but that gravel or class 5 can be acceptable in certain situations where driveways are exceptionally long and/or designed to maintain the natural contours of the land. Councilors also noted a preference for a concrete or blacktop transition where the driveway meets the road so that gravel does not spill into the road.

<u>Highlights from the Regular City Council Meeting – Thursday, July 13th</u>

- Consent agenda approved including: mechanical licenses, approval of Council minutes of 4.13.2023, 5.11.2023, Special Council meetings of 4.13.2023, 5.10.2023, 5.25, 2023, and 5.31.2023, City financials, approved Night to Unite Proclamation, Adopted Countywide comprehensive emergency operation plan, approved CUP for 9 Sandpiper, and Resolution accepting donation newsletter from Traditions Bank.
- Animal Control Office Mario Lee spoke of the need to strengthen the dangerous dog ordinance
 as part of our animal ordinance. It would be helpful if the City ordinance would reference the
 Minnesota State Code which would provide means to more effectively enforce citations of
 dangerous dogs.
- Incarnation Lutheran Church presented their request for ground mounted solar panels in the East parking lot of church. This would save \$500K over 25 years and reduce fossil fuel use. Council agreed to review the City ordinances on solar panels and determine next steps forward.
- Peace United Methodist Church presented their request for a new church sign which would include a 2 x 8 digital component. Church has been in in community since 1960 and current renovation plan includes parking lot, interior, and signage. The total sign dimensions would be approximately 6 x 9 feet, similar to Incarnation. The Sign Ordinance will be reviewed to determine appropriate guidelines based on zoning and location.
- City of North Oaks has been awarded Age friendly MN grant for \$22, 901 from MN Department of Health and Services, with focus on creating a plan for additional services for older residents

of North Oaks. City Planner reviewed costs, what is allowed use and possibly plan for holding a social event for senior community members to gain input, develop an action plan and strategy for implementation. Result of plan could involve trails, ADA ramps, signage, connectivity, training, etc. Council approved Motion by vote of 4-1 to accept \$22,901 in grant money as presented, and spending up to \$25K to engage community in order to develop Age Friendly action plan.

- City Attorney discussed the new Gate Hill development with twin home and standalone townhomes. Each City has a maximum amount of Floor area ratio (F.A.R.) allowed for new developments. RCM PUD zoning F.A.R. for this development is not specifically expressed in the approved documentation for individual lot calculations or aggregate F.A.R., and needs to be clarified for building official to continue plan reviews. Five permits have been issued for standalone townhomes. The recent twin-home plan submittals are .45 F.A.R. which exceeds .375 for RCM district. F.A.R. can also be calculated on a sitewide aggregate basis if you take full development site and subtract roads and wetlands, for a total of .35 F.A.R for all units. The question for Council is whether the F.A.R. for Gate Hill is calculated by individual unit or on aggregate basis as anticipated by developer during the plan approval process. It was noted aggregate F.A.R. is used in several other planned unit developments (PUD) in North Oaks. Motion to approve Resolution 1486 to clarify documentation that Gate Hill F.A.R. is to be calculated as aggregate was approved by vote of 4-1.
- Administrator Kress asked Council for direction whether they preferred directional drilling vs.
 encasing the watermain for the Charley Lake Townhome water connection to Shoreview.
 Shoreview performs directional drilling for their watermain installations. City Engineer stated
 encasement would be helpful in case of water main break, but directional drilling should be fine
 underneath Hodgson as it is a short distance. Motion to move forward with directional drilling
 approved 5-0.
- Fire District formulation model is proposed for Lake Johanna Fire District and budgetary items
 instead of a Joint Powers Agreement model. Councilors to review the memo in packet and
 provide questions back to Administrator Kress. If moved to Fire District formula there would be
 no fire personnel on the board with voting authority, City representatives on the board would
 be making decisions.
- Council reviewed the preliminary subdivision(plat/plan) application for a 17-lot single family residential subdivision of Tract R in RLS 640 (Red Forest Way South). The 35.09-acre property is part of the larger 87.7-acre property is identified as "Site K" (North Black Lake) in the East Oaks Planned Development Agreement (PDA). This is the final location to be developed in North Oaks. There will be trails on perimeters and custom grading on lots K-Q. Staff reviewed plans and determined plans do comply and recommended approval. Applicant North Oaks Company has also requested to grade the site prior to the Final plan approval. Motion to approve Resolution 1487 to approve preliminary plat for Red Forest Way South, and Resolution 1488 to allow grading activity on Red Forest Way subject to conditions, were approved by a vote of 4-1.
- An update on the County Road J and I-35E Interchange Project will be discussed in the next City Council meeting.
- Motion approved by 5-0 to amend the City calendar to move the August City Council meeting to Thursday, August 24th due to staff vacations and time required to prepare Council packet materials.

Storm Cleanup Efforts Continue

Thank you to Mel's, Xcel Energy crews, and the many residents who helped with cleanup after the storms on Wednesday evening. Overall, there were approximately 45 downed trees that Mel's worked to clean up on the roads, and more than 427 residents without power as a result of the incident. Cleanup efforts are ongoing, and we appreciate your patience as contractors work through the damage.

A few reminders in the aftermath of the event, and for future safety:

- Do not approach any downed power lines as they may be live and pose a safety hazard.

Special City Council Meeting – Wednesday, July 12

Highlights from the Special City Council meeting include:

• Infrastructure Master Planning effort – City Administrator Kress shared a list of potential projects that the City and NOHOA could work on to improve community infrastructure. The goal of the list is to identify key areas of focus for the Master Infrastructure Plan, and other items that can be pulled off as side projects. Once Councilors select an engineer for the project, they will prioritize which items to include in the plan. Councilors authorized City Administrator Kress to request a scope of work on the Master Infrastructure Plan from the engineering firm Sambatek as a finalist for the project.

Acceptable driveway materials for surfacing – City Administrator Kress explained that the
current ordinance stipulates that driveways must be made of concrete, bituminous material or
an approved equivalent suitable to control dust and drainage. He felt the wording of the
ordinance was broad and requested that the council provide some guidance on how to
interpret the ordinance and what materials are acceptable. Councilors agreed that in the case
of long driveways, a concrete or bituminous material pad up close home is preferred, but that
gravel or class 5 can be acceptable in certain situations where driveways are exceptionally long
and/or designed to maintain the natural contours of the land. Councilors also noted a
preference for a concrete or blacktop transition where the driveway meets the road so that
gravel does not spill into the road.

Highlights from the Regular City Council Meeting – Thursday, July 13th

- Consent agenda approved including: mechanical licenses, approval of Council minutes of 4.13.2023, 5.11.2023, Special Council meetings of 4.13.2023, 5.10.2023, 5.25, 2023, and 5.31.2023, City financials, approved Night to Unite Proclamation, Adopted Countywide comprehensive emergency operation plan, approved CUP for 9 Sandpiper, and Resolution accepting donation newsletter from Traditions Bank.
- Animal Control Office Mario Lee spoke of the need to strengthen the dangerous dog ordinance
 as part of our animal ordinance. It would be helpful if the City ordinance would reference the
 Minnesota State Code which would provide means to more effectively enforce citations of
 dangerous dogs.
- Incarnation Lutheran Church presented their request for ground mounted solar panels in the East parking lot of church. This would save \$500K over 25 years and reduce fossil fuel use. Council agreed to review the City ordinances on solar panels and determine next steps forward.
- Peace United Methodist Church presented their request for a new church sign which would include a 2 x 8 digital component. Church has been in in community since 1960 and current renovation plan includes parking lot, interior, and signage. The total sign dimensions would be approximately 6 x 9 feet, similar to Incarnation. The Sign Ordinance will be reviewed to determine appropriate guidelines based on zoning and location.
- City of North Oaks has been awarded Age friendly MN grant for \$22, 901 from MN Department of Health and Services, with focus on creating a plan for additional services for older residents of North Oaks. City Planner reviewed costs, what is allowed use and possibly plan for holding a social event for senior community members to gain input, develop an action plan and strategy for implementation. Result of plan could involve trails, ADA ramps, signage, connectivity, training, etc. Council approved Motion by vote of 4-1 to accept \$22,901 in grant money as presented, and spending up to \$25K to engage community in order to develop Age Friendly action plan.
- City Attorney discussed the new Gate Hill development with twin home and standalone townhomes. Each City has a maximum amount of Floor area ratio (F.A.R.) allowed for new developments. RCM PUD zoning F.A.R. for this development is not specifically expressed in the approved documentation for individual lot calculations or aggregate F.A.R., and needs to be clarified for building official to continue plan reviews. Five permits have been issued for standalone townhomes. The recent twin-home plan submittals are .45 F.A.R. which exceeds .375 for RCM district. F.A.R. can also be calculated on a sitewide aggregate basis if you take full development site and subtract roads and wetlands, for a total of .35 F.A.R for all units. The

question for Council is whether the F.A.R. for Gate Hill is calculated by individual unit or on aggregate basis as anticipated by developer during the plan approval process. It was noted aggregate F.A.R. is used in several other planned unit developments (PUD) in North Oaks. Motion to approve Resolution 1486 to clarify documentation that Gate Hill F.A.R. is to be calculated as aggregate was approved by vote of 4-1.

- Administrator Kress asked Council for direction whether they preferred directional drilling vs.
 encasing the watermain for the Charley Lake Townhome water connection to Shoreview.
 Shoreview performs directional drilling for their watermain installations. City Engineer stated
 encasement would be helpful in case of water main break, but directional drilling should be fine
 underneath Hodgson as it is a short distance. Motion to move forward with directional drilling
 approved 5-0.
- Fire District formulation model is proposed for Lake Johanna Fire District and budgetary items
 instead of a Joint Powers Agreement model. Councilors to review the memo in packet and
 provide questions back to Administrator Kress. If moved to Fire District formula there would be
 no fire personnel on the board with voting authority, City representatives on the board would
 be making decisions.
- Council reviewed the preliminary subdivision(plat/plan) application for a 17-lot single family residential subdivision of Tract R in RLS 640 (Red Forest Way South). The 35.09-acre property is part of the larger 87.7-acre property is identified as "Site K" (North Black Lake) in the East Oaks Planned Development Agreement (PDA). This is the final location to be developed in North Oaks. There will be trails on perimeters and custom grading on lots K-Q. Staff reviewed plans and determined plans do comply and recommended approval. Applicant North Oaks Company has also requested to grade the site prior to the Final plan approval. Motion to approve Resolution 1487 to approve preliminary plat for Red Forest Way South, and Resolution 1488 to allow grading activity on Red Forest Way subject to conditions, were approved by a vote of 4-1.
- An update on the County Road J and I-35E Interchange Project will be discussed in the next City Council meeting.
- Motion approved by 5-0 to amend the City calendar to move the August City Council meeting to Thursday, August 24th due to staff vacations and time required to prepare Council packet materials.

Highlights from the Thursday, July 25th Planning Commission Meeting

- Motion to amend City Code Title 15, Chapter 151 was approved unanimously. This includes
 adding back language regarding amendments that were inadvertently struck from the City Code
 as part of some 2019 amendments. The proposed changes also clarify the process for amending
 the Comprehensive Plan and ordinance/map and add language regarding the Board of Appeals
 and Adjustments.
- Motion to approve proposed amendments to Chapter 34 Planning Commission composition and
 responsibilities, with modification to 34.06 C & D to add language regarding City Council report
 date change to February 1st, and updating "City" and "Chair" to be capitalized, was unanimously
 approved. The amendment clarifies the role of the Council liaison to the Planning Commission,
 Commissioner attendance policies and the Commission powers and duties as provided in state
 statutes.
- Kress will follow up with North Oaks Company to schedule a tour of the new development sites for Planning Commissioners.
- Future Planning Commission meeting topics may include reviewing CUP and Variance language
 on building height, excess garage space and septic systems to ensure they are still serving the
 City well. Cremons noted that Peace United Methodist church is looking to put in an electronic
 sign and Incarnation Church is looking to put in ground solar panel neither of which are
 currently allowed by Ordinance. A subgroup will review solar, signage, home height, garage
 ordinances, then bring them back to the Planning Commission for further discussion.

Reminder and Updates on Complaint Policy in North Oaks

When a citizen has a complaint about ordinance violations or anything related to the activities and responsibilities of the City, complaints should be submitted in writing via the complaint form on the <u>City of North Oaks website</u>. This form can be dropped off, sent by US mail or email to <u>northoaks@northoaksmn.gov</u>.

Upon receipt of a complaint, the City Administrator will investigate the claim to determine if there is an ordinance violation and what, if any, action should be taken. In the past, the City would issue letters to residents with corrected action needed. Moving forward, if the complaint is justified, a letter will be sent by the Prosecuting Attorney outlining corrective action needed and a date by which the issue must be resolved.

Coexisting with Coyote

There have been a few coyote sightings in the area. Coyote have been reported throughout all suburban areas (not just North Oaks), and the reality is there are as many coyotes as food sources available to them. Help discourage coyotes from taking up residence by cutting back brush, because it attracts the type of wildlife coyotes thrive on. The recommendation is that lower limbs and branches of shrubs and trees be pruned back to a height of two feet.

Leaving pet food and available water outdoors for your pets has been known to encourage coyote visits. Remove all human sources of food, as a coyote that becomes dependent on humans for food may

Learn about Emerald Ash Borer Tree Disease from the City Forester

As Emerald Ash Borer disease starts to take over the ash trees in our community, <u>watch a 4 minute</u> <u>video by City Forester Mark Rehder</u> as he educates residents about Emerald Ash Borer, how to identify Ash trees, dangers of not taking action, and options residents have to deal with this increasing problem.

Key signs of Emerald Ash Borer are:

- Thinning leaves in the tree crown
- Branches die back
- Bark splitting along the branches
- S shaped galley underneath bark splits
- "D" shaped holes exit holes
- New sprouts on the trunk
- New woodpecker activity

Also, coming soon to the <u>"Forester's Nook" on the City website</u> will be a list of recommended replacement trees which can be planted in place of dying ash trees. Residents may contact the City Forester at 612-760-3519 with any questions.

Current Oak Wilt Status in Twin Cities is HIGH

We are currently in HIGH oak wilt season. Oak wilt is a fatal tree disease caused by a fungus that affects all species of oak trees. Oak wilt spreads from diseased to healthy trees either below ground via connected roots or above ground by insects.

Please do not prune oaks from April through July to prevent infection by sap beetles. If there is an unavoidable wound to oaks trees, cover the fresh wound with a latex-based paint or shellac as quickly as possible. Scam Advisory

Swindlers impersonating Deputies are back with their "Wanted on a Warrant" telephone scam.

SCAM ALERT - The Sheriff's Office received several reports from citizens on Thursday, June 25, who had received a telephone call from a 'Ramsey County Deputy' asking for money over the phone to avoid being arrested for an outstanding warrant. If you receive a call asking you to send money to stop a warrant please hang up - the call is not coming from a real Ramsey County Deputy.

Government agencies do not call people and ask for money via the phone or via pre-paid credit card. This scam, or theft by swindle and fraud, has been attempted throughout the country over the past few years by thieves posing as various government agents. The "wanted on a warrant" scam has been attempted in Ramsey County previously.

If you have been a victim of this, or any scam, please call 9-1-1 and report it to your local law enforcement agency.

If you received this scam call, avoided becoming a victim, and have a caller ID number from the suspect, please send that information in an email to AskSheriff@co.ramsey.mn.us.

Branch / Rubbish Removal Across Community

As storm cleanup continues across our community, the City asks residents to take a fresh look at all sides of your property to ensure downed branches, piles of old wood and other rubbish items are picked up and kept out of view. This increase in fallen and broken trees along roadsides has been particularly noticeable after the big storm last month. In addition, the Operation Clearview initiative requires residents to keep brush / limbs trimmed back 5 feet from road and 12 feet up to ensure clear lines of site for those traveling and walking our roads.

As a reminder, Mel's services clears downed trees from roads that are safety hazards, however it is each property owner's responsibility to remove the wood/debris that has been left behind and pushed to the side of the road. Tree companies may be backed up due to storm clean up, therefore please reach out and get on their schedule.

Highlights from the Thursday, August 24th City Council Meeting

- Council approved consent agenda items including: new arborist and mechanical licenses, liquor license for Farm Fest, Ramsey County Sherriff's Office Interagency Agreement, minutes of the City Council 7.13.2023 and Special City Council 7.12.23 meetings.
- Ben Welinski, Wildlife Biologist with the USDA Wildlife Services presented on Wildlife Management services available to the City, including deer, goose, turkey and beaver management.
- Deputy Lassegard and Jeff Ramacher, Undersheriff of Public Safety Services for the Ramsey County Sheriff's Office gave a report on crime in the City and how the Sheriff's office works to combat crime. Residents also shared comments and concerns about a recent rise in criminal activity and their desire for measures to be put in place to reduce this activity. Councilor John Shuman presented his recommendations for the City to adopt an Emergency Notification system and License Plate Reader cameras at various entrances throughout the City. The Council asked Councilor Shuman to work with NOHOA, RCSO and the City Attorney to develop a

- plan for how these measures could be implemented in the City.
- Sambatek engineering presented a revised plan and scope of services for developing a Master Infrastructure Plan for the City of North Oaks. This would be a long-term plan for how to improve key areas of infrastructure over time in the City. City Council accepted the proposal with support from Andrew Hawkins, President of the NOHOA Board.
- City Council made plans to host an informational table at Farm Fest on Sunday, September 10th at the Hill Farm historic site. This will be a great opportunity to connect with residents and provide sign up opportunities for the City Eblast or to be a neighborhood block captain.
- Council approved the 9th Amendment to the East Oaks Planned Unit
 Development Agreement. This amendment clarifies how Floor Area Ratios
 should be calculated, as well as the location of sidewalks in side-yard
 setbacks, setbacks from property lines, and the separation of driveways for
 attached twin homes.
- Council approved several amendments to City Code Chapters 34 and 151, Planning Commission composition and Comprehensive Plan, resolutions of summary publication.



Exterior Lighting Complaints

With the introduction of LED bulbs, there has been an increase in light complaints in the City. When purchasing LED bulbs, please be aware not all LED lights are the same. There are a variety of wattage and intensity options to provide soft light (but not light up the neighborhood like a Walmart parking lot).

City Ordinance 151.053 also requires that lights be "down-shielded", the direct bulb source not be viewed at any angle, and not spilling into neighbors' yards to impact others. When purchasing LED bulbs and making new light fixture selections, please consider the intensity and impact on neighbors and wildlife. Refer below for more information.

County Road J / 35E Interchange Project

County Road J from Centerville Road to Otter Lake Road – including the interchange with I-35E – is scheduled for reconstruction in 2025. Ramsey County is leading the project in partnership with the Minnesota Department of Transportation, Anoka County, White Bear Township, North Oaks and Lino Lakes.

The existing I-35E and County Road J interchange –and the surrounding area – has several safety, congestion and access issues that impact pedestrians, bicyclists and motorists. Additional development is expected near the interchange in the next five years, which will increase traffic and worsen safety issues.

Three areas are targeted for improvement:

- The I-35E and County Road J interchange.
- County Road J from Centerville Road to Otter Lake Road.
- Centerville Road from County Road J to North Ash Street.

- Just because the sweeper is coming, doesn't mean they can pick up your leaves.

DO

- It's important to keep the drains clear before the ice damns appeared, both in the road and your gutters



Superfund Site - Ground Water Sampling of Select Homes

The Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA), in conjunction with Whirlpool Corporation (Whirlpool), Arconic, and GHD Services Inc. (GHD) is coordinating a routine groundwater sampling event of residential wells of some private wells during the period from September 26-28, 2023. The groundwater sampling is a remedial action activity associated with the 1993 Highway 96 State Superfund Site located in White Bear Township.

The 28 residential wells designated for sampling this round will receive a letter with information on who to contact to schedule the sampling. The wells are part of **Sampling Group A** which includes selected addresses on: Buffalo, Eagle Ridge, East Oaks, Hummingbird, Poplar, Quail, Ski, Thompson and West Shore. All residential well samples will be analyzed for volatile organic compounds and chloride. Whirlpool and Reynolds are paying for sample collection and laboratory analyses, so there is no cost to you. This sampling is voluntary, and residents can choose whether to participate.

For those residents wishing to conduct water sampling of their own well water, refer to the Minnesota Department of Health list of accredited water testing laboratories accepting private samples.

Fire Department Meeting:

 City Council members from North Oaks, Shoreview and Arden Hills attended a presentation at Lake Johanna Fire Department at 5545 Lexington Avenue to discuss funding / contracts.



Security Workshop:

- Security Integrators Convergint and Genetec met with members of City Council, NOHOA and the North Oaks Company to discuss their Closed-Circuit Television (CCTV) and License Plate Recognition products, and answer questions regarding data and privacy concerns.
- City to meet with Attorney regarding data privacy act and what it would look like if NOHOA could be made the owner / purchaser of the product as a private entity.
- NOHOA to have additional discussions on what that it could look like as Security falls under City purview in the Community. Only Sheriff's

- department would have access to the encrypted data under specific conditions.
- North Oaks Company stated they may be open to looking at the Hill Farm condominium as a trial for this product, as well as possible gates.
- No motions were made, informational meeting only.

Highlights from September City Council Meeting

- Consent Agenda approved, included: City financials, Mechanical licenses, CUP for excess garage space at 12 Columbine, Minutes of 8.24.23, 3-year City auditor agreement, Amendment to the City's senior housing revenue refunding note at Shoreview Sr. residence project, gambling permit for the Children's Hospital Association Raffle at the North Oaks Golf Club.
- Officer Lassegard shared information about a recent burglary in Waverly Gardens, fraud alert, reminders about watching for children at bus stops and reminders to call 911 in an emergency, NOT Deputy Lassegard. See full report below.
- North Oaks Security Initiatives Councilor Shuman asked Council to allocate \$45k of funding for an Emergency Notification System and a License Plate Reader system. Funding for the License Plate Reader system would be conditional on several issues being resolved, including: a task force made up of representatives from City Council, City Staff, NOHOA, the North Oaks Company and the RCSO can fully review the system and get all questions of privacy and efficacy answered, the vendor can demonstrate that there is an option for residents to opt-out if they do not want their license plates being read, and City staff and the City attorney can work out issues on who would own the data and whether it would be considered public. This would be a 1-year pilot program that the community would evaluate at the end of the term. Council voted in favor of allocating the funding and moving forward with a task force to further evaluate the License Plate Reader system and whether questions and concerns of data privacy can be resolved.
- Public Hearing re: establishment and operation of cannabis businesses. No residents provided comments. City Attorney Bridget Nason gave a presentation with background on the issue. Council voted in favor of an interim ordinance prohibiting the establishment and operation of cannabis businesses. This interim ordinance will last until January of 2025 and will allow the city to complete a study regarding appropriate time, place and manner restrictions on cannabis businesses.
- City Council voted in favor of an ordinance prohibiting cannabis use in public places.
- Councilor Watson gave an overview of a new Joint Powers Agreement that is being worked out with White Bear Township for municipal water system connections. This agreement would replace the 1999 agreement and would apply to all residents who are currently in the White Bear Township service area. Two key items from the agreement: the municipal water and sewer services agreement will continue, and service will continue to be provided to the development areas outlined in the 1999 PDA.

City Administrator Kevin Kress gave an overview of the preliminary 2024 budget/levy. Council approved the document. This sets the maximum spending for the coming year, and allows City Staff to work on fine-tuning numbers and reducing costs where possible before finalizing the budget in December 2023. The Truth in Taxation meeting will take place at 7 p.m. on Thursday, December 14th at the beginning of the regular City Council meeting. Replacement Trees for Ash Lost to Emerald Ash Borer

North Oaks is losing thousands of ash trees to the Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) and a very popular question is what can they be replaced with? Replanting sites especially after dramatic events such as firestorms or even beetle infestations are an important component of forestry management and good stewardship. While preferences range from property owner to property owner, the important component is that trees get replanted and replaced. Ash trees are unique in that they prefer moist soils and fairly sunny tops. We often find them in low areas and near wetland edges but they populate the high grounds as well. Considering your plant community is very important when thinking about planting new trees.

Often times the best approach is to replace with what

was lost since you know it already grows well there. This won't work for Ash trees (at least not in the short-term) but there are similar trees to ash that are good replacements.

This list below is based on the University of Minnesota's recommended species for ash replacement and includes trees such as:

 Aspen, Elm, Hackberry, Silver Maple, Birch, Swamp White Oak, Northern White Cedar, Cottonwood

These trees are mostly intended to be placed in the forest or forest edge or where the woodland used to be before EAB. If you are replacing a yard tree lost to EAB, the palette you can choose from is much larger.

Highlights from the 9.28.2023 Planning Commission Meeting

- Approved Minutes of the 8.31.2023 Planning Commission Meeting
- Conducted public hearing and discussion on amending City Code Chapter 151 to include ground mounted solar installation processes, establishing a CUP application process and conditions for ground mounted solar in RSM District. Key points include: CUP application submittal and review process, only allowed in RSM zoned district, requires a 10-acre minimum lot size, must be on the side or rear yard, must meet all principal building setbacks, and landscaping is required to buffer the panels. There are only 3 parcels in City that would qualify and none of them are within the North Oaks Homeowners Association boundary. Commission approved recommendation of amendment to City Code Title XV, Chapter 151, regarding solar energy systems Ordinance as drafted, by a vote of 5-1. The recommendation will go before City Council on October 12th.
- Conducted public hearing and discussion on proposed amendment to City Code Chapter 151 regarding signs in the RSM Residential-Single-Family medium Density District. The sign Ordinance amendments would

allow: Electronic center messaging signs in RSM district, with minimum lot size of 3.5 acres, on an arterial or collector street (such as Hodgson), display for minimum of 8 seconds (no flashing), limit sign lighting to 6 a.m. – 11 p.m., and max sign area of 32 sq. feet (only 16 sq. ft. may be ECM). There are 20 lots that would meet these restrictions. Peace United Methodist Church spoke on behalf of their desire for monument and electric messaging sign to replace their current temporary printed signs. Commission approved amendment to Chapter 151 of the City Code regarding signs in the RSM-Residential Single-Family medium Density District as drafted, with the update of allowing both a primary and secondary use of the building on the fixed monument portion of the sign. Motion approved unanimously. The recommendation will go before City Council on October 12th.

- Discussion on amending City Code Chapter 150 regarding garage sizes. Currently the Conditional Use Permit process allows homeowners to go through the application process for garages in excess of 1,500 square feet up to 3,000. This process costs homeowners time, money, as well as City Staff, engineers, planners, City Council, and Planning Commission time and expense. After researching historical data, if all the conditions and setbacks requirements are met in the Ordinance, all CUP applications for excess garage space have been approved. Commission agreed it makes sense to increase the square footage threshold for having to submit a CUP for excess garage Space. A sub-committee will draft a proposed amendment addressing this issue and schedule notice for Public Hearing at the October 26th Planning Commission meeting.
- There will be 2 Planning Commissioner seats up for appointment beginning January 1, 2024. There is a 1-year term completing the remainder of Commission Weins term (resigned due to moving out of country), and one 3-year term. Those with term ending were asked to let the City Administrator know if interested in being considered to serve another term.



Highlights from City Council Meeting 10.12.2023

Council had a moment of silence to honor the passing of longtime resident
Joan Brainard. Joan was one of the original residents of North Oaks and
some of her many contributions include; City Councilor, founder of the North
Oaks News, and co-author of the North Oaks historical book "Three Bold
Ventures". Her sharp mind, knowledge and love for the well-being of the
North Oaks Community was evident in every phone call made to the City

- and Councilors, and every article written to express her views. She was an invaluable resource to the community and will be greatly missed.
- Resident Kingston spoke in support of ground solar. Resident and NOHOA
 Board Member Long, encouraged residents to review and vote on NOHOA
 budget which focused on a "Roads 1st" priority.
- Deputy Lassegard provided his monthly report. Two burglaries are under investigation.
- Appearance by State Senator Heather Gustafson to introduce herself. She invited Council to share any concerns with her and highlighted new legislation which provides dollars for public safety initiatives: Ramsey County Sherriff's office was allocated 6 million to help meet needs. She has toured Lake Johanna's Fire Department and they hope to focus budget next year on Fire and EMS needs. SRO's are back in schools. There was an increase in school funding: 7.8 million to Moundview in 2024, White Bear Township will receive 7.4 million in 2024.
- Presentation by City Forester Mark Rehder included discussion on:
 - Update on storm response and possible development of a City preparation / vendor resource plan in future.
 - Operation Clearview focus is on intersections making sure cars can navigate safely corners with good sightlines. Winter is good time to trim branches of those encroaching on roads.
 - At least 1,000 diseased Emerald Ash Borer trees have been removed in the Community. Focus is on main thoroughfare and will continue marking diseased trees over the winter. City plans to order 500 seedlings to arrive in May to give out to residents. Might look at purchase bare root trees to help residents most severely impacted by Ash disease.
- Lake Johanna Fire Department District. Arden Hills turned down the Fire
 Department request to change the structure of the Fire Board to a Fire
 District model. Shah noted prefer to stick with current model that has worked
 in past. Watson also agreed with denial, but noted there are items in the
 current governance model that could use revision. Motion approved to
 support not supporting the Fire District model.
- Discussion on RCSO contract. Overall City budget is proposed at 9.6% increase, and Ramsey County Sheriffs contract is increasing to 11.2% in 2024. North Oaks is allocated 3.75 FTE's. Council would like some measure of service that we are paying for, and additional visible law enforcement presence. A workshop will be set to discuss security options to ensure best use of funds and service contract moving forward.
- Discussed White Bear Lake Township Joint Powers Agreement. The new
 document will likely be broken down into 2 agreements: water and sewer
 systems. White Bear Township will provide sewer only to new Red Forest
 Way South area, not water at this time. Resolution 1496 was approved to
 amend the Comp plan to reflect Red Forest way will connect to sewer only,
 and escrow will be put in place to fund repairs.
- Considered Ordinance amending City Code Title XV, Chapter 151, regarding Solar Energy Systems. There is no NOHOA ASC policy on ground mounted solar panels. Discussion on whether it should be expanded to be more inclusive option for smaller lots or more restrictive to larger lots. Motion

- approved to continue discussion to November Council meeting.
- Considered Ordinance amending Chapter 151 of City Code regarding signs in the RSM District. Resolution 1497 approved to allow digital signage via CUP process for RSM zoned properties on arterial collector streets.
- Councilor Shuman reported the emergency notification system working with the City to get implemented. Genetec working on an opt out feature on license plate reader cameras and working on data ownership issue. The North Oaks Company is ready to install readers on poles on new Centerville Road locations when given authority. Information given to Rapp Farm to determine if they want to be part of initial pilot program. Looking to bring in vendor for residents to home security information.
- There was a joint stakeholder meeting with NOHOA in the afternoon to highlight current projects.
- City Administrator noted NOHOA has requested Council to consider funds for road striping. Will discuss possible funding of various items for 2024 during workshop. Charley Lake townhome water connection to Shoreview water is in progress. Deer tags will be requested from DNR, and have them come speak to Council to present options. Ramsey County plans for reconstruction to of County Road J interchange will be forwarded to Council.

World Stroke Day - October 29

In honor of World Stroke Day coming up on October 29th, the Minnesota Department of Health encourages everyone to learn the warning signs and get help immediately. Because "time lost can be brain loss", it is important to know the signs of stroke and err on the side of safety and call 9-1-1.

An easy way to remember how to recognize a stroke is "BE FAST:"

- B Balance loss. Does the person have sudden loss of balance or coordination?
- E Eyesight changes. Is eyesight suddenly blurred or double? Is there a sudden loss of vision?
- F Face drooping. Does tone side of the face droop or is it numb? Ask the person to smile.
- A Arm weakness. Is one arm weak or numb? Ask the person to raise both arms. Does one arm drift downward?
- S Speech difficulty. Is speech slurred, are they unable to speak, or are they are they hard to understand?
- T Time to call 9-1-1.

STROKE

If the person shows ANY of these symptoms, even if

the symptoms go away, call 9- 1-1 and get them to a hospital immediately.



Drought Conditions throughout Minnesota -Help conserve our Natural Resources

Believe it or not despite the latest rain, Minnesota is still under drought conditions. With drought expanding and a portion of the state now in extreme drought, the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources is carefully monitoring the situation and taking steps as outlined in the Minnesota Statewide Drought Plan. The weekly U.S. Drought Monitor map released Thursday, Oct. 12 shows:

• 24% of Minnesota is experiencing abnormally

- dry conditions.
- 33% of the state is in moderate drought, decreased from 8% last week.
- 35% of Minnesota is in severe drought, decreased from 36% last week.
- 5% of the state is in extreme drought, decreased from 8% last week.

Areas currently experiencing extreme drought will require at least five to eight inches of rain over several weeks to replenish water resources, and areas experiencing severe drought will require at least three to five inches of rain over several weeks to replenish water resources.

Minnesotans are encouraged to learn how much water they are using. Learn more about water conservation and identify ways to reduce water use. Reducing use today saves water for the future.

Quick Facts:

- Wilkinson Lake is impaired for nutrients.
- Wilkinson Lake receives water from land in 5 cities (North Oaks, White Bear Township, White Bear Lake, Vadnais Heights, and Lino Lakes), 5 upstream lakes (Birch, Tamarack, Black, Amelia,



- and intermittently Gilfillan), and a total of 3,115 acres.
- Wilkinson Lake is a strategic location where several waterways come together.
 Water flows from Wilkinson into Deep and Pleasant Lakes.
- The project will be located on land owned by North Oaks Farms (DBA North Oaks Company) and is also part of a Minnesota Land Trust Conservation Easement.
- This project is the first in an anticipated series of projects that will work together to improve water quality and reduce nutrients to improve this impaired waterbody.
- This work will direct water around natural wetlands, small islands, and dividers for filtration purposes.

Lake Gilfillan Aeration Notice

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the City of North Oaks has applied for an aeration permit for Gilfillan Lake to prevent winterkill.



The aerator is located on the NW side of the lake at 8 Poplar Lane, North Oaks, MN, 55127 – Section17, T30N, R22 W, Ramsey County. The aerator helps add oxygen to the water in Gilfillan Lake. When lakes freeze over in the winter and become iced over, no new oxygen can make its way into the water. When it snows on the ice no sunlight can reach the underwater plants, and they cannot make oxygen. When oxygen levels get too low, fish can suffocate, causing a winterkill.

Aeration on Gilfillan Lake will cause thin ice and/or open water. Pay attention to warning signs and use extreme caution on Gilfillan Lake this winter.

Highlights from the City Council Meeting 11.9.2023

- Deputy Lassegard gave his monthly security report. See full report in the Safety and Security Section below. Of note were two drunk driving arrests in October, both of which resulted after vehicle accidents, as well as some new fraud schemes targeting seniors. Deputy Lassegard also noted that he has been encouraging newer deputies to patrol in the city to get familiar with the area. Councilor Shuman asked if Deputy Lassegard would create a report at a future meeting that compares crime per capita in the City of North Oaks against surrounding cities.
- Councilor Watson gave a report on the Ramsey County Sheriff Office contract. RCSO is requesting an 11% increase in funding for the 2024 budget. He suggested that the City negotiate with RCSO to reduce cost on several areas. Council decided to move forward with the 2024 budget increase for RCSO, but look more closely at the issue for coming years in future work sessions.
- City Administrator Kress noted that he would like to cancel the TimeSavers Secretarial contract for recording minutes at City Council meetings. Minute taking will revert back to City Staff. Council agreed. He will continue to look for other areas to cut costs.
- Mayor Wolter presented a petition that she received from 63 residents with concerns about cameras and gates as security initiatives being considered by the Council, and requesting transparent discussion on the topic. Councilor Shuman shared that a task force has been created to look at several items, and they are taking privacy concerns voiced by residents seriously. They are exploring expanding the Neighborhood Watch program, adopting an Emergency Notification System, as well as License Plate Recognition Cameras at a number of entrances. He will make sure that future task force meeting dates will be published for the public attendance.
- City Administrator Kress has received a proposal from the USDA for deer management. The upper end of the proposal was \$56,700 for 40 scouting and bait stations

and up to 20 visits from personnel. The USDA is currently the only licensed organization that can conduct deer management in the state. Council approved a motion to move forward with a scaled back version of the proposal that includes 10 days of deer management service (approximately \$29,000) with a report for each day of service. After the 10 days of service, council will evaluate the program and determine if it makes sense to extend the program. Council also approved a motion to have the County do an aerial count of deer to get a better sense of the population in the city to inform future deer management efforts.



- Legal Services with Levander, Gillen, and Miller, PA were terminated. Approved Resolution 1501 to amend the 2023 Appointments/ City responsibilities to reflect Kennedy and Graven as City Attorney. City Attorney Bridget Nason has switched firms to Kennedy and Graven and will remain our primary City Attorney with Jim Thomson as backup.
- Approved Resolution 1502 to authorize renewal of 2024 Liquor Licenses for Tria Restaurant, Wine Street Spirits, Panino's, Suishin, North Oaks Golf Club, Taste of Scandinavia, as well as Tobacco licenses for Walgreens, North Oaks Golf Club, Wine Street

Highlights from 11.30.23 Planning Commission Meeting


- Discussion of Variance request 23-7 from Charles Cudd to install a 1,000-foot solid fence along Centerville Road to provide privacy and noise buffer for the new Spring Farm Preserve townhome development. Commission heard from residents, discussed details of the application and alternative natural barriers. Applicant to meet with City Forester, North Oaks Company, Homeowners Association and City to discuss further potential resolutions. A 60day extension letter will be sent to applicant, and discussion will continue at the next January 25, 2024 meeting.
- Commissioners discussed revisions to the language for garage size limits, to allow garages up of 2,000 square feet as long as it meets F.A.R and other requirements/regulations. Garages in excess of 2,000 up to 3,000 sq. feet would require a Conditional Use permit. A public hearing will be scheduled for the January 25, 2024 meeting to gain public input, and make recommendation to City Council.



- Commissioners discussed potential amendment to clarify setback requirements for new home applications in excess of 35 feet, up to 45 feet as allowed through the CUP process. City staff will tweak language and draft exhibits to be part of CUP application. A public hearing will be scheduled for the January 25, 2024 meeting to gain public input, and make recommendation to City Council.
- Commissioners discussed CUP requirements for Ordinance regulating home height. Considerations were made related to topography and what is considered a natural condition for a walkout/lookout home to determine if individual properties meet "suitable site" criteria. It was generally agreed that 6 foot difference in the natural (unaltered) grade between the front and back of home could be reasonable metric for a walkout. A public hearing will be scheduled for the January 25, 2024 meeting to gain public input. and make recommendation to City Council.

Do you have holiday lights that are no longer working and need to be disposed of? LED holiday lights cannot go in the trash because they contain printed circuit boards and are considered hazardous.



SAFETY

Thin Ice Awareness

As the weather is turning colder, please be mindful of thin ice conditions and stay safe around ponds and lakes. The lakes and channels of North Oaks often have running water underneath from the Mississippi River or aerators that make them particularly vulnerable to unforeseen dangers.

Parents and guardians should talk with their children and neighborhood children about staying away from the ice unless there's adult supervision. This includes lakes and rivers, as well as neighborhood ponds, retention ponds and anywhere ice forms.

Ice seldom freezes uniform, especially early in the season. Wait for at least 4 inches of clear, solid ice to form before walking on it. Check thickness before you head out, and as you go with an ice chisel. In addition, tell someone else where you're going, carry along ice picks and a rope, and wear a life jacket or buoyant gear. If you fall through the ice into cold water, a life jacket will keep your head above the surface and give you time to assess the situation and get yourself out of trouble.



Highlights from the City Council Meeting - Thursday 12.14.23

- Conducted Truth in Taxation hearing. Resolution 1503 approved for 2024 City tax levy of \$2,476,679. At 11.83%, North Oaks retains the lowest tax rate of neighboring communities. The County and School district tax portion went up significantly. If you qualify and your taxes have gone up over 12%, you can apply to Ramsey County for a tax program rebate. If you feel your property has been assessed higher than the home value, refer to the back of your tax statement for how to file a petition.
- Deputy Lassegard summarized the Sherriff's activity for the month of November. Key issues include construction equipment thefts, porch theft of holiday deliveries. Refer to the full report below. He will present a 2023 year-end recap at the next January 11, 2024 Council meeting.
- Representatives from Charley Lake Condo
 Association came to thank Council for efforts in
 getting their 20 townhomes connected to
 Shoreview City water. They expressed concern
 over the unanticipated high cost of engineering
 services on this project. They will return at future
 meeting once all bills come in to discuss costs of
 this shared resource which could provide water
 service to more homes in the future. Motion passed
 to pay Minger construction for their services to date
 on the installation of the system.
- There was discussion on Earned Sick and Safe Time (ESST) Leave Policy and Personnel Policy.
 To meet new State ESST requirement by the January 2024 date, the City staff PTO schedule has been modified comparable to other Cities.
 Resolution 1504 approved to structure PTO 80 hours up front to ensure employee retention and minimize logistical costs of tracking accrual of time.
- Residents are invited to attend a safety and security task force meeting on Thursday January 11th at 5:00 p.m. (prior to the next City Council meeting). The public and other key stakeholders such as NOHOA and North Oaks Company are invited to come in and share questions, thoughts and concerns over safety in our community and possible solutions.
- Committee continues to work on the Master Infrastructure Plan including water use, road standards and an interactive website for the community to provide feedback on these topics.
- A new Ninenorth technical manager has been hired to replace Pat Cook. Damon Price will begin



- January 2nd and will help support North Oaks cable broadcast and display needs.
- North Oaks was selected as a "Best Cities under 10,000 population" by Business View Magazine.

Prevent Package Theft This Holiday Season

During the holiday season, "Porch Pirates" take advantage of increased package deliveries to steal from homeowners. The City has received several reports of package theft in recent weeks near Cunningham Road and Hill Farm/Red Barn areas. Consider the following tips to prevent package theft at your home:

- Ask a trustworthy neighbor to watch for and retrieve your package when it is delivered.
- Request "signature required" service from the delivery company.
- Place a storage container, such as a large Rubbermaid, on your stoop for packages to be placed in so they are not readily seen by people driving by.
- Place a note on front door asking delivery driver to leave packages on the back steps.
- Have packages delivered to your work or a business address if possible.
- Deposit outgoing mail in official USPS drop boxes.

If a package has been inadvertently left on your doorstep, be a good neighbor and drop it off at the intended home or return it to the delivery carrier.

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources encourages Minnesotans to use caution and stay aware of wildfire risk. Lack of snow and unusually warm, dry conditions over the next week are likely to increase fire danger in much of Minnesota. Dry, brown grasses and vegetation mean wildfires can start easily and spread quickly; this elevated risk is likely to persist until we have continuous snow cover.

It is best to wait to burn brush or vegetative debris until there is at least 3 inches of snow cover on the ground. Alternatively, Minnesotans are asked to consider composting, chipping, or transporting materials to a brush collection site as alternatives to burning.

Check current conditions on the DNR fire danger and burning restrictions webpage. Also, be sure to follow safe debris burning tips: (mndnr.gov/wildfire/prevention/debrisburning) to help reduce wildfire risk.
